



# Collar-Up Cowl

Add this fun cowl to your favorite sweater for full coverage when the wind blows. Turn the collar down for new look.



**KNITTING LOOM:** Double Knit Loom

**YARN:** Red Heart Treasure, worsted weight. 70% acrylic, 30% wool, hand wash cold. Aprox. 100 yds, in color Abstract

**STITCHES:** Stockinette

**NOTIONS:** Knit hook, crochet hook

**SIZE:** 6" height, 18-20" circumference

**GAUGE:** 4 rows=1"

## ABBREVIATIONS

Approx=approximately

S=stockinette

st(s)=stitch(es)

## INSTRUCTIONS

Roll up approx 30 inches of yarn before the loop knot, and keep it attached. It will be used to crochet the neckline once complete.

Cast on 52 stitches in stockinette, using both inner and outer looms, set up to work in double knit flat panel. Do not connect the beginning stitch to last stitch. Lay anchor yarn around the loom between the pegs. Allow yarn to drop below the loom while working.

Work 14 rows in Stockinette until you have approx 3" of knit.

**Row 15:** At opening, move the loop from peg 1 to peg 52, and the loop from peg 52 to peg 1, for reinforcement. This twist will keep the opening from pulling out of shape. Work the row in the round by connecting the first and last sts.

Continue working for a total of 14 rounds, or until the cowl is approx 6" deep from cast on sts.

Bind off loosely. Place all loops on inner loom onto the outer loom. Now 2 loops are on outer loom and the inner loom is empty. Hook over the bottom loop over the top. Pull the knit

down so that the loops do not jump off the pegs. Crochet off loosely, starting at yarn tail.

### **Finishing the neckline edge**

Using the yarn at neckline, work a crochet edge around the neckline and into the opening. Work with the edge stitches and one single crochet between the stitches. This will give a more defined edging to the collar or stand up cowl.

A button can be added to upper corner and a loop of yarn for closing. This will give a very regal look. It can also be worn open to front or side, and look more like a collar. Either way, it makes a very warm neck cover when the wind blows.
